The Augustine Family Reunion took place July 13-15, 2018. The last reunion was three years ago in Hays, KS. Planning started early to enable as many people to participate as possible. As in previous years, it was organized by reunion committee members consisting of family members. This reunion was held for the first time at the Rose Garden Banquet Hall on the southeastern outskirts of Hays. Pam Burgardt (nee Flax) has owned, operated and catered the food at the Rose Garden for 15 years. Pam is also a part of the Augustine family. The other activities that could not be forgotten were eating and drinking, of which we were well taken care of and having fun. There was also the raffle with numerous prizes, a Polka Mass held by Pastor Earl Befort with a choir and in the evening there was music and dancing. The Wes Windholz Polka Band was well received as the dance floor was always filled until the music stopped playing at 10 p.m. There was a lot of picture taking and of course there was the genealogy corner in which Barbara Schuster, Ann Augustin (nee Klaus), Gerald Christoffel and Micheal. Augustin were available for questions on family research. Mrs. Virgil (Ann) Augustine displayed a quilt made up of marriage pictures of Michael and Anna Augustine and their family. DEATH OF PAUL MASSIER

Sent to the Bukovina Society for publication

Paul Massier, a member of the International Board, passed away on July 6, 2018, at the age of 94. He was an active member of the Society since it was first organized. At various Bukovina Society conferences, Paul gave lectures about his ancestral migration from the German state of Birkenfeld to Bukovina, about family history, and about methods of documenting family histories. Both his paternal grandfather, Ferdinand, and his father, Johann, were



born in Alt-Fratautz, Bukovina, Austria. His grandfather was a missionary who pioneered the German Baptist movement in Bukovina and Galicia during the late 1800's and early 1900's. Paul's father emigrated to the USA in 1903, settled in Chicago, later became a homesteader in Idaho and after several crop failures moved to Pocatello, Idaho to work for the Union Pacific Railroad. There he joined the First Baptist Church and became a very active member.

Paul has written many books about his family history, genealogy, travel to Bukovina in Romania and his own memoirs. In 1989 he retired from the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California where he had worked for 34 years as a researcher and supervisor. His advancements in technologies and sciences included investigations of heat transfer in rocket engines, new horizons in rocket propulsion, basic noise research in supersonic jets, use of supersonic diffusers for rocket engine testing, confined vortex flows in supersonic nozzles, direct conversion of heat to electricity, and many other investigations. Results of these investigations were presented at national and international technical conferences and were published in many technical journals.

He was a member of several professional organizations, including the New York Academy of Sciences, the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, the Research Society of Sigma XI, and others. Biographical sketches of Paul appear in many Who's Who type publications, including Who's Who in the World, Who's Who in America, Who's Who in Frontier Science and Technology, Distinguished Achievements in Engineering, Leading Engineers in the World.

Paul obtained a Master of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in 1949. He served in the U.S. Army for nearly three years during World War II and during that time participated in the Battle of Okinawa in the Asiatic-Pacific Theater of Operations.

Paul was preceded in death by his first wife, Miriam Parks Massier, by his parents, John and Katie Massier, and by three brothers: Johnny, William and Emil. Surviving him are his two daughters: Marilyn Schwegler and Paulette Holden, two sons-in-law, Spencer Schwegler and Douglas Holden, four grand children and nine great-grand children.

GERMAN BOHEMIAN DIALECT CD

Dr. Valentin Reitmajer sent a copy of his CD to me from Germany: Deutsch-Böhmische Mundart: Erzählungen, typische Ausdrücke und Lieder. Dr. Reitmajer also authored a cookbook of the Bohemian Germans in Pojana Mikuli (Buchenhain). He generously donated the rights to the cookbook to the Society as translated by Dr. Sophie Welisch. The CD contains 14 tracts of text and songs as edited by Dr. Reitmajer with particpants, Rainer Fuchs, Gretl Geishauser, Maria Hackel, Edeltraut Pinzl, Monika and Dr. Reitmajer, and Angela Stöhr. The singers are the *Chor der Buchainer Nachkommen* directed by Irene Schreiber with accompaniment by Max Heiden.
